## >>> CELIA TEAM HOSTS A SUCCESSFUL NETWORKING EVENT

The **CELIA team** hosted a successful networking event in October which aimed to bring researchers from across Canada together to identify needs and gaps for future research on coercive control within intimate partner relationships. Nine researchers in diverse psychology. criminology, sociology, and mental health fields, three graduate students, and a team from Waypoint, Carleton University, and Niagara University in Ontario spent a day presenting their related research and discussing its implications for understanding, defining, and advancing research on coercive control. Finally, researchers at the event discussed collaborations in future research in a number of priority areas related to coercive control.



## WRI WELCOMES A NEW HEALTH SYSTEMS IMPACT FELLOW

The objective of his project is to utilize hospital data to validate risk-assessment tools pertaining to aggression, violence and seclusion, thus ensuring a safer health care environment. ## >>> A FAREWELL (BUT NOT GOODBYE) TO YVETTE BROOK

Like everyone at Waypoint, I'm sad to say farewell to our colleague and friend, Yvette Brook, who retired as the Executive Director of PCFC this month. I met Yvette almost four years ago when I started as the Director of Research & Academics in March 2021. I knew immediately that Yvette and I would get along well. I connect with and trust people who live their values, who say the right thing even when it's the hard thing, who challenge us to think and do differently. She does all of those things with grace and wit. I connected with Yvette because she is exactly who she is: an advocate and authentic human who dedicated her career to ensuring patient voices are heard at Waypoint. I'm forever grateful for knowing her.

In early 2022, the WRI and PCFC signed an agreement to work closely together in patient-oriented research, including co-funding a lead position to serve as a central lived experience leadership voice. At the time, we had just one or two patient-oriented projects getting off the ground. Now we have nine projects underway, with some supported by funding from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. Yvette's leadership and vision have been key to this progress, putting Waypoint on the map as an organization that not only values patient voices in research and practice but ensures people with lived experience are leaders at the table.

Thank you, Yvette, for your leadership, your friendship, and everything you've done to make Waypoint a better place. I'm looking forward to working with Kayla as the interim ED to carry your vision forward.
